Introduction

- 1. There are many men and women recorded in the pages of inspiration that exemplify reverence
 - a. These examples are found both in the Old and New Testaments
 - i. Old Testament examples are written for our learning (Rm. 15:4)
 - ii. New Testament examples show us how Jesus and His church behaved in a similar culture as ours (Acts 17:16)
 - b. Our mission is to examine several of these men and women so that we can learn and grow in reverence toward God
 - i. This will not be an exhaustive study but will hopefully spark further interest for additional study
- 2. One of the first examples of reverence we encounter in our Bibles is Noah

Noah's Character

- 1. Noah is described by God as, "a just man, perfect in his generations. Noah walked with God" (Gen. 6:9 NKJV)
 - a. "just" describes the concept of being righteous before God (Gen. 7:1)
 - i. God Himself has this character (Ps. 119:137)
 - ii. God is a just judge (Ps. 7:11)
 - iii. Noah was described as, "a preacher of righteousness" (2 Pt. 2:5)
 - b. "perfect" describes the concept of being blameless (Dt. 18:13)
 - i. The Passover lamb was to be "without blemish" (Ex. 12:5)
 - ii. Morally, no wickedness (sin) could be laid to Noah's charge by God
 - iii. This differed greatly from those around Noah (Gen. 6:5, 11-12)
 - c. "walked with God" shows Noah's complete committal to God
 - i. The same was spoken about Enoch (Gen. 5:22-24)
 - ii. We can infer from <u>Heb. 11:5</u> that this means Noah pleased God and thus found grace in His eyes (<u>Gen. 6:8</u>)
- 2. Noah's character is worthy of imitation

Noah's Mission

- 1. Noah was instructed to build an ark (Gen. 6:13-16)
 - a. Specific, not generic, instructions were given
 - i. Wood must be gopherwood (Gen. 6:14)
 - ii. Must have rooms (Gen. 6:14)
 - iii. Must be covered inside and outside with pitch (Gen. 6:14)
 - iv. The length must be 300 cubits, the width 50 cubits, and the height 30 cubits (<u>Gen.</u> 6:15)

- v. Must have a window (Gen. 6:16)
- vi. Must have a door (Gen. 6:16)
- vii. Must have three decks (Gen. 6:16)
- 2. Noah was instructed regarding his family and creatures to take in the ark (Gen. 6:17-21)
 - a. Specific, not generic, instructions were given
 - i. Noah, his wife, his sons, and their wives were allowed to go into the ark (Gen. 6:18)
 - ii. Male and female creatures by two (by sevens for clean animals) were to go into the ark to be kept alive (Gen. 6:19-20, 7:2-3)
 - iii. Noah was to take food (Gen. 6:21)
- 3. Noah had a mission from God

Noah's Reverence

- 1. Noah's reverence is first seen in his character (Gen. 6:9)
 - a. One who does not reverence God will not be a just individual nor will he be blameless (Ps. 36:1)
 - b. One who does not reverence God will not walk with God
 - c. One who does not reverence God will not be a preacher of righteousness as Noah was (2 Pt. 2:5)
- 2. Noah's reverence is seen in his strict obedience to God's commands (Gen. 6:22, 7:5)
 - a. The book of Hebrews further validates this point (Heb. 11:7)
 - b. One does not reverence God who disobeys Him in even the smallest detail
 - i. What if Noah had chosen a different wood?
 - ii. What if Noah had changed the dimensions of the ark?
 - iii. What if Noah had added another door?
- 3. Noah's reverence is seen in his worship (Gen. 8:20-22)
 - a. He did not sacrifice unclean, but clean animals
 - b. He took of every clean animal and bird, nothing spared
 - c. God smelled a soothing aroma (Gen. 8:21)
 - i. How can something completely burned smell good?
 - ii. Consider what the world smelled like before the flood (Gen. 6:5-7)
 - d. Reverence offers to God the very best and exactly what He desires (Pr. 3:9)

Conclusion

- 1. Noah serves as an excellent example of reverence
 - a. In his character
 - b. In his strict obedience to God's commands
