Introduction

- 1. On Paul's second missionary journey, he received the Macedonian call which landed him in the city of Philippi (<u>Ac. 16:6-12</u>)
- 2. As the book of Acts concludes, we find Paul as a prisoner in Rome (<u>Ac. 28:16</u>, <u>30-31</u>)
- 3. In his letter to the Philippians, Paul encouraged the saints to, "work out your own salvation with fear and trembling" (<u>Php. 1:1, 2:12</u>)

I. Christ Humbled Himself and Obeyed

- 1. In the beginning was the Word (<u>Jn. 1:1-5</u>)
 - a. The Word became flesh (Jn. 1:14)
 - b. His name was called Jesus (<u>Mt. 1:21-25</u>)
- 2. For the Word to become flesh took humility (Php. 2:5-8)
 - a. "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, who, being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God," (<u>Php. 2:5-6</u> NKJV)
 - i. Christ had great glory with the Father (Jn. 17:1-5)
 - ii. Jesus is equal with God (Jn. 5:17-18)
 - b. "but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, *and* coming in the likeness of men." (<u>Php. 2:7</u> NKJV)
 - i. Christ emptied Himself to become a bondservant and to put on flesh (<u>Mk. 10:45</u>)
 - c. "And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to *the point of* death, even the death of the cross." (<u>Php.</u> <u>2:8</u> NKJV)
 - i. Not only did Christ show humility in becoming a man, He also showed it in His obedience to the cross (<u>Heb. 5:7-9</u>)
 - ii. Christ did what was necessary to obey His Father and enabled the possibility of our salvation (<u>Eph. 1:3-7</u>)
- 3. God exalted His obedient Son (Php. 2:9-11)
 - a. "Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name," (<u>Php. 2:9</u> NKJV)

- i. God exalts the humble in due time (<u>1 Pt. 5:6</u>)
- ii. No other name by which we must be saved (<u>Ac. 4:12</u>)
- b. "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and *that* every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ *is* Lord, to the glory of God the Father."
 (Php. 2:10-11 NKJV)
 - i. All people everywhere should recognize this fact and bow the knee [reverence] at the name of Jesus and confess Him as Lord
 - ii. There is coming a day when every knee <u>shall</u> bow and every tongue <u>shall</u> confess (<u>Rm. 14:11-12</u>; cf. <u>Isa. 45:23</u>)

II. We Must Humble Ourselves and Obey

- If the only begotten Son of God humbled Himself and obeyed God, so must we (<u>Jn. 6:38</u>, <u>8:29</u>)
 - a. The Philippians understood the need to obey, and Paul knew they had obeyed when he wrote, "as you have always obeyed" (<u>Php. 2:12</u>)
- 2. Baptism is the beginning, not the ending (<u>Jn. 3:3-5; 1 Pt. 1:23</u>)
 - a. Our salvation requires us to keep on obeying God beyond baptism
 - b. The Philippians were commanded to "work out" their own salvation (<u>Php.</u> <u>2:12</u>)
 - c. Fear and trembling is required (Php. 2:12)
- 3. Not our own system, but God's system of salvation (Php. 2:13)
 - a. God has done his part, but we must do our part in keeping His will
 - b. Apostasy is possible i.e., we can fall away from God

Conclusion

- 1. God sent His Son to save the world (<u>Jn. 3:16-17</u>)
- 2. We must humble ourselves and submit to God's will in our lives
- 3. "Do all things without complaining and disputing, that you may become blameless and harmless, children of God without fault in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world, holding fast the word of life, so that I may rejoice in the day of Christ that I have not run in vain or labored in vain." (<u>Php. 2:14-16</u> NKJV)
